## Investing in the resilience of pastoral communities

or centuries, pastoralism has been a traditional way of life for many communities in Kenya. Long before colonialism and even independence, pastoralism had been the most viable production system in drylands.

Today, over 29 counties in Kenya are classified as Arid and Semi-Arid Land (ASAL) counties. And the mainstay in these counties is pastoralism, subsequently their contributions to the national economy cannot be underscored. These counties, however, continue to face perennial erratic weather including reduced amounts of rainfall, rise in temperature and prolonged and frequent periods of drought, and in some instance instances of flash-flood leading to the animals being drowned; while the occurrence of severe and recurring drought periods leads to a scarcity of both forage and water, which ultimately leads to starvation and malnutrition among the In essence, the negative impact of climate change has a converse relationship with production for the pastoralists.

Considering the wide array of detrimental effects that climate change and extreme weather events have on cattle production, it is imperative to acknowledge the significance of climate change implications. This acknowledgment is crucial to safeguard the enduring survival and sustainable future of pastoralist communities in the long run.

Beyond vulnerability to climate change, pastoralists often experience cycles of poverty, food insecurity, and limited access to markets. This calls for a multi-dimensional approach to address these challenges holistically. The De-Risking, Inclusion, and Value Enhancement (DRIVE) project offers a viable way out for the pastoralists.

The project supports the provision of financial de-risking in anticipation of drought (i.e., insurance and financial services) for the main asset of pastoralists livestock to allow them to invest in their herds. Furthermore, it will better connect pastoral production groups with markets, support trade infrastructure for cross-border and small-scale trade, and strengthen capacity to meet international standards requirements.

By investing in the resilience of these communities, we are confident that we can unlock their potential and create a sustainable pathway for their survival and also ensure their contribution to the broader economy.



The project has two main components:

- De-risking pastoral production through a package of financial services for climate resilience and
- 2. Promoting livestock chains through trade facilitation and private-sector support.

KDC which has a heritage of creating, nurturing, and growing commercial and industrial enterprises in Kenya for over 65 years will oversee component two of the Drive project which is about value chains and trade facilitation. This component aims to enhance the competitiveness of the livestock value chains and support

access to local and international markets by facilitating livestock trade across the HOA countries and mobilizing private investments.

This will be done through upgrading quality infrastructure, trade facilitation, and trade logistics, facility to de-risk private investment in the Livestock Value Chain and support local productive capacities.

As we launch this project, we are buoyant that by investing in pastoral communities and supporting their efforts to adapt to climate change and other challenges, Kenya can build a more resilient and inclusive economy. This will benefit not only pastoral communities but the entire country.
